

CONSULTATION ON THE

SONI TRANSMISSION CONNECTION CHARGING METHODOLOGY STATEMENT

30TH JUNE 2016

Under Condition 30 of the SONI Transmission Licence, SONI, in co-operation with the Republic of Ireland Transmission System Operator must prepare a statement setting out the basis upon which charges will be made for connection to the All-Island Transmission Networks at entry or exit points on the Transmission System.

In line with the Utility Regulator's Update Note on Contestability in Connections¹ dated 3rd June 2016, SONI are today launching a 4 week consultation on the SONI Transmission Connection Charging Methodology Statement to take account of required changes for the implementation of Contestability.

website (<u>www.soni.ltd.uk</u> and may share them with the Utility Regulator. Respondents who wish that their response remain confidential should highlight this when submitting the response.

Respondents should be aware that as the Utility Regulator is a public body and nonministerial government department, the Utility Regulator is required to comply with the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). The effect of FOIA may be that information contained in consultation responses that is shared with the Utility Regulator is required to be put into the public domain. Hence it is possible that all responses made to this consultation that may be shared with the Utility Regulator will be discoverable under FOIA, even if respondents ask for the responses to be treated as confidential. It is therefore important that respondents take account of this and in particular, if asking that the responses are treated as confidential, should specify why they consider the information in question should be treated as such.

SONI are continuing to work closely with Northern Ireland Electricity Networks and the Utility Regulator and are committed to providing transmission contestable connections to applicants of 5MW or above by the end of August 2016.
